



What is an Urban Forest?


“The ecosystem composed of all trees and plants, both intentionally planted or occurring naturally and the soils they grow in” -Council Policy C027


Who does all of this?

- Parks and Recreation – City parks and medians
- Public Works – Trees in the public rights of way
- Engineering – land development, inspection, CIP
- Planning and Building – land development
- Fire Department



Background

- 1988 – Street Tree Management Plan
- 2003 – Street Tree Plan
- 2007 – Inventory
- 2013 – Street Tree Master Plan



Current Program

- ~9,600 street trees
- Pruning – goal is 2000 trees annually
- Planting – pro-active, replacements
- Removal – life cycle, dead, diseased



Funding

General Fund

- \$108,000 – pruning
- \$20,000 – emergencies, reports
- \$11,800 – planting
- \$10,200 – removals

Total- \$150,000



Contracting

Maintenance Services

- West Coast Arborists, Inc.
3 year contract (2015)
- Emergencies – Misc. contractors
- Reports – Misc. contractors

Parks Make Life Better!



Tree Maintenance for Parks, Beaches, Streetscapes and Trails

- Landscape Contractors
(Trees up to 15 feet)
- Tree Trimming Companies
(Trees over 15 feet)
- Streetscape Trees



Tree Trimming and Removal

- Tree Inspection by certified arborists
- Data entered into City Works
- Trimming perform on an 'as-needed-basis'
- Tree Remove Procedures



Selection of Tree Species

- Landscape Plan
- Replacement trees are chosen by “Right Tree in the Right Place”



Department Funding

- General Fund: \$75,000
- Lighting and Landscape Districts: \$113,402



What's Working

- 3 Certified Arborist on PRD staff
- Ability to select Multiple Tree Companies
- City Works Software



Areas for Improvement

- Streetscape Tree Maintenance
- Vacant PBS position
- Limited budget





Parks Make Life Better!

Project Review

- Planning Department lead
 - Engineering input/assistance
 - Arborist input as needed
- Trees on/adjacent to site identified
- Alternatives to removal explored
- Work to preserve trees
- Conditions of approval
 - Protection during construction
 - Ongoing maintenance



Heritage Trees

- Planning Department
- Nominations for trees on public or private property
- Environmental Commission recommendation
- Planning Commission designation
 - Oldest and largest of species in Encinitas
 - Unique form or species
 - Historic significance
 - Defining landmark or significant outstanding feature



Tree Removals

- Engineering Department
- Work with homeowners/developers to limit removals
- Temporary Encroachment Permit
 - Arborist report required
 - Reviewed by Public Works and Parks
 - Addresses removal and required replacement tree (1:1)
 - Monitored by Engineering Field Inspection
